Pastor Paul's Monthly Message for March

Dear Members and Friends,

I always enjoy the first school chapel service of the month. Why? Because, Mr. Kevin leads the chapel and provides the message. I know what you are thinking. Pastor Paul likes this chapel the best because he doesn't have to prepare anything or do anything. Incorrect! As a pastor, it is usually me that has the responsibility of giving the sermon or the message. It is great to be motivated and inspired by someone else. Mr. Kevin does this every time.

Today's chapel service was no exception. Mr. Kevin gave a very interesting take on the story of Jesus clearing the temple of all the sellers and money changers. He made the statement that "Jesus was not nice" in this story. One of our adorable young students said out loud, "I have never heard 'Jesus' and 'not nice' in the same sentence before." Mr. Kevin described Jesus overturning tables and chasing people and animals out with his whip of chords. He was angry and telling people that he would not have his Father's house turned into a den of thieves. Jesus was causing a commotion and disturbing something that was considered acceptable by the religious community of his day.

More examples of "un-nice" behavior were given from Jesus' life. He called the Pharisees and Scribes a brood of vipers. Not so nice to refer to people as snakes. Jesus upset the religious leaders by healing people on the Sabbath, breaking the Sabbath rules. He told Peter, "Oh, ye of little faith," when he starting to sink when he was walking towards Jesus on the water. Jesus regularly made people uncomfortable with what he had to say. If you had money, beware, because it is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle, than for a person of wealth to enter the kingdom of God. Jesus was not nice!

Mr. Kevin informed the LES students that he did not consider it a compliment to be called "nice." Being nice doesn't demonstrate any depth of character. If we are to follow Jesus' example, nice doesn't fit. Jesus was much more interested in doing what was right, and being loving, kind, compassionate, and sacrificing. It wasn't important to be nice.

God is not interested in superficial nice-ness. God wants us to stand up and do the right thing no matter how people react. Sometimes people might feel uncomfortable. Sometimes they might even get angry at us, but people got mad at Jesus too. God wants us to truly be loving, kind, compassionate and giving, and God wants us to speak out against those who are not. This is the example Jesus gave us to follow. Wonderful message, Mr. Kevin!

Church Council Highlights — February 20, 2018 Meeting

Bay Ridge Center (presented by Pastor Paul)

- The construction of a new senior center is still a main focus of the administration and board. The NYC Department for the Aging is supportive of the plan. Hopefully, this will move forward in the next few months.
- The March for Meals (walkathon) will take place on Saturday, March 24th.

Worship & Music (presented by Dennis Monsen)

- Positive worship experiences included Three Kings Sunday (1/14), Annual Meeting Sunday (1/28), Ash Wednesday service (2/14).
- An organ assessment took place and it is clear that work should be done to help maintain and restore our instrument. An initial phase will begin shortly.
- The Worship/Music Commission will meet on Tuesday, February 27th.

Lutheran Elementary School (presented by Pastor Paul for Doris Dunn)

- The School Board recommended John Sletholt as a new member of the School Board. The motion was made and unanimously passed to enable John to officially join the School Board.
- Re-registration has begun for the 2018-2019 school year. A letter accompanied the re-registration material, informing the parents of the additional staff changes/retirements planned for next year. A fully developed staffing plan was shared in order to avoid any parental concerns.
- Work has already begun in planning the annual Dinner/Dance fundraiser on April 13th.

Property (presented by Steve Solby)

- Will be meeting with John from Sure Foundation to help prioritize our property improvement list for 2018. We want to move forward on the highest priority items first. Much of our work, however, involves weekend activity, so we don't disturb our weekday ministries.

Sunday School (presented by Kathy Finkelstein)

- The current Sunday School material involves a Lenten theme. This matches well with our Sunday morning worship.
- A Piggy Bank project in March will bring money in for hurricane victims in Houston, Texas.
- The Sunday School children have created a poster that will be displayed in the narthex of the church very soon.
- The Sunday School children will sing at our Sunday morning worship on Mother's Day.

Healing Center (presented by Laura Caruso)

- Antonia did a nice job of presenting the Healing Center ministry at our annual meeting on January 28th.
- A part time program manager has been hired (Sandra Torres). This will help free up Antonia for more Executive Director functions.
- A \$7k grant from the NY Women's Foundation was received and Antonia has applied for all the annual discretionary funding grants.
- The Teen Dating Violence Awareness walkathon is scheduled for April 14th.

Church Council Highlights — February 20, 2018 Meeting (continued)

- The focus of the Board of Directors was discussed at the last board meeting on February 7th. Financial health will be the primary focus. Board meetings will go to monthly, with the board taking on the responsibility of fundraising. Antonia will move from managing day to day operations, to working more on development. This discussion was well received by the board.

Evangelism (presented by Deacon Tony)

- Deacon Tony will take on the leadership role for the Wednesday Lenten Reflection & Prayer services at 7:00 p.m. The council was encouraged to attend.

Fellowship (presented by Lisa Johansson)

- The Bethlehem women celebrated Valentine's Day and Chinese New Year at their meeting on Friday, February 16th. They will meet again on Friday, March 16th.
- Several women have signed up for the Koinonia Women's Weekend, April 20 – 22.

Public Relations (presented by Ray Palermo)

- The new resized banners need to be ordered. The Lenten banner should include the mid-week Prayer & Reflection services at 7:00 p.m.

Finance Report (presented by Pastor Paul)

- The January 2018 financial report was reviewed and accepted as presented.

Pastor's Report (presented by Pastor Paul)

- Visitations (15), Funerals (3), Baptisms (0), Weddings (0)
- A motion was made and passed to change all evening services to 7:00 p.m. This should give people enough time to get home from work, but not make it too late for our members.
- The youth group had a great time at Koinonia. The conditions were great for winter activities in the snow. The spiritual theme for the weekend was "Traditions" (which ones we should keep and which ones should be left in the past).
- The annual meeting successfully accentuated the wonderful work of our church and our ministries in 2017.
- Property sale: No change in status to the sale of our 415 Ovington Ave. apartment building.
- The first benevolence gifts were approved for 2018. \$500 will be given to both our Cub Scouts and Boy Scouts on Scout Sunday in March.

At the core of the Meals on Wheels (MOWs) service is a nutritious meal, companionship, and a watchful eye on the health and safety of our seniors. For those who have trouble getting around, we bring the service to you.

For millions of Americans, MOWs is literally the difference between remaining in their own homes or needing to relocate to a nursing facility. Research proves that when seniors have the right support, they gain greater quality of life, need fewer hospital stays and live longer.

For many seniors, the trusted MOWs worker who shows up every day with a hot meal and a warm smile is the only person they see or speak with all day. This special delivery is the reason to get up in the morning, something to look forward to, and a reminder to take good care of themselves.

Along with the inevitable impacts of aging come the increased risks of medical emergencies, falls and other accidents. The safety check that accompanies each meal delivery helps to reduce falls, trips to the hospital or premature institutionalization. It also ensures that, in the case of an emergency or problem, medics will be called, families will be notified and our seniors will not be forgotten. Millions of American families sleep better at night and can continue their daily routines and responsibilities because they know that Bay Ridge Center is keeping a watchful eye over their loved ones and raising a red flag if something doesn't seem just right.

And, MOWs saves money. We provide a senior with daily meals for an entire year for roughly the same cost as one day in the hospital.

Bay Ridge Center provides MOWs for over 600 older adults in our community every day. We need our community's support to continue to meet the growing need.

Please join us on March 24th to March for Meals and raise awareness of how much this service helps our seniors.

I Believe You

No part of our society is immune from the sober realization that our leaders are being exposed as a source of the abuse of power over those under their care, control and influence. Virtually every level of our shared public lives has been stunned by the almost daily revelations of various forms of abuse and mistrust of public figures from politics, entertainment, education, healthcare, sports and religion. We corporately and individually share pain, disappointment, and a sense of betrayal of trust upon hearing of yet another case of abuse.

These stories are not just “out there”, but they are also “in here”. By that I mean, in our roles as congregational members and leaders, we are entrusted by others who share their stories of pain. These courageous voices are nurtured by our sacramental ministry but also yearn for our ministry of counsel, sympathy, support, guidance and healing.

In fact, as I listen to these stories – when shared to me in person or shared nationally – I hear something shifting. Voices that have been silenced, or ignored, or belittled, are speaking up and being heard. These voices and stories, with their variety and diversity, expand our range of viewpoints so we stand on new terrain. Sometimes I am so shaken I mumble to myself, “Jeeze, I didn’t really know how bad it was”. These stories reach beyond the abuses of our public leaders in our work environments to our homes. For example, the Mayor’s office reports an average of 230 calls a day to the New York City Domestic Violence Hotline and an average of 250 calls a day to the NYPD reporting intimate partner abuse.

Years ago, I listened to a woman describe her story of being abused by a trusted leader in the community. After she finished, I paused to take it all in, and then said, “I believe you”. The look of surprise and relief on her face at being heard, at being believed, was striking and unforgettable.

“I believe you” gave her new life as the secret was shared.


Times like these tempt us to feel cynical. Yet, when we see a survivor of abuse find a new life of safety and healing, our cynicism turns to hope as we witness that person move from death to life. We as a community of faith can be a sanctuary for similar voices and stories that need to be heard and believed.

We believe you.
